There are several resources that older Californians access or that you can use to assist your customers with disaster preparation and response. The following is a list of disaster preparation and response resources available through the California Office of Emergency Services and the Red Cross.

Listos California Resources

Listos California Emergency Preparedness Campaign readies Californians for disasters like wildfires, earthquakes and floods, and pandemics like COVID-19. They have several valuable resources available to assist older adults with preparing older adults with for emergency events.

Listos California's website provides several resources for individuals and community providers to prepare for emergencies. These resources include disaster preparedness text messages, safety and survival tutorials, disaster preparedness training tools and materials, a disaster preparedness toolkit, and social media toolkit. Cal Alerts

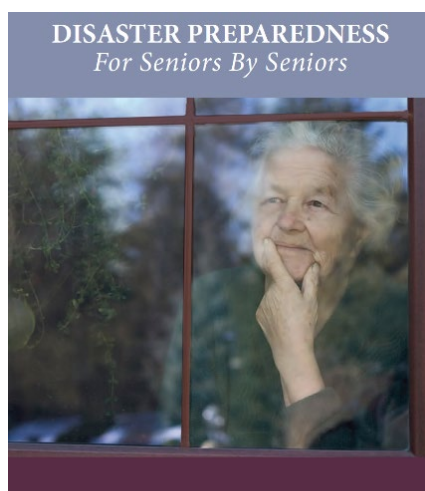

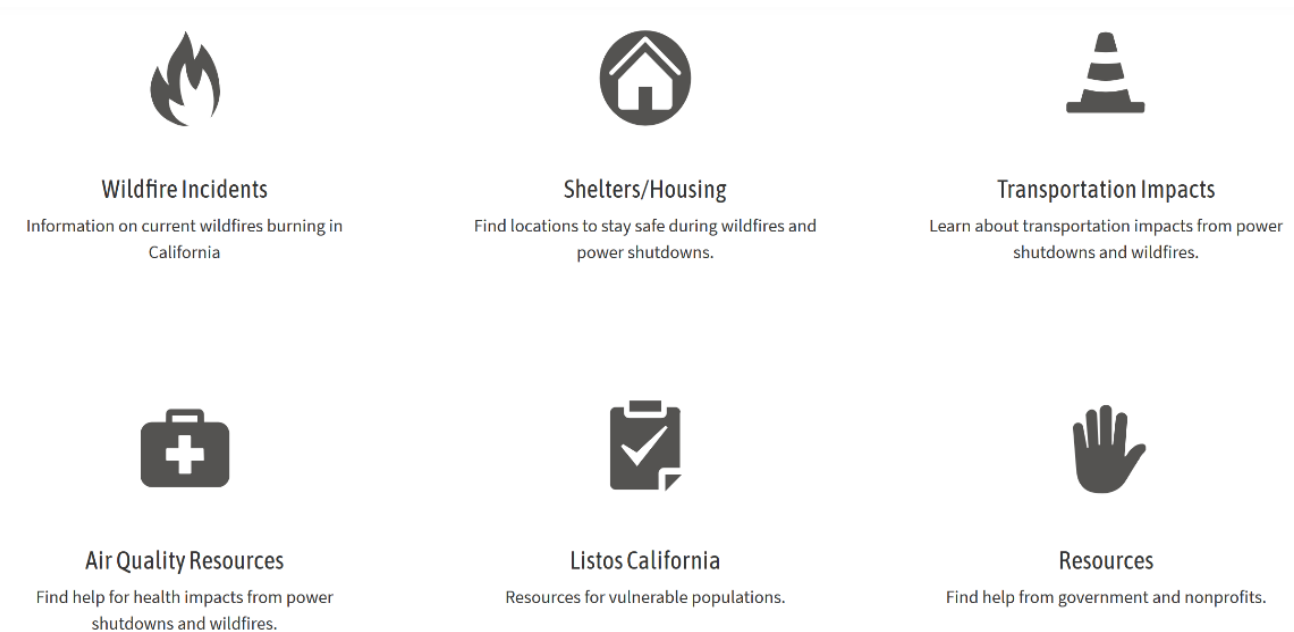
Per CAL FIRE guidance, if an area is evacuated due to wildfires, individuals are to immediately evacuate. Evacuating is always safer than remaining home during COVID-19. If an individual waits until the last minute to evacuate, the roads may have heavy traffic and road conditions may be dangerous. Blowing embers and debris from the fire may make it hard to see.

When an individual evacuates an area, they should always try to maintain at least 6 feet of physical distance at all times, and wear a cloth face covering. While traveling in a vehicle, keep windows shut to protect against smoke inhalation.

Disability Disaster Access & Resources

[The California Foundation for Independent Living Centers](#) recently launched [Disability Disaster Access & Resources](#). The program assists people with disabilities and older

adults with access and functional needs prepare for a disaster through personalized emergency planning support, preparedness training, and securing resources and supports for those who use assistive technology and/or durable medical equipment such as a powered wheelchair, bed, communication device, oxygen machine or CPAP during a utility Public Safety Power Shutoff.

If you or someone you know has been evacuated or lost your assistive technology or durable medical equipment due to a fire, you may qualify to have it replaced through the [Richard Devylder Disaster Relief Fund](#). Wildfire Response and COVID-19

As California battles historic wildfires, COVID-19 has not gone away. New precautions to keep evacuees safe include health screenings, mask requirements, social distancing, and air purifiers in congregate shelters.

COVID-19 Evacuation Precautions

- **Health screenings and assessments before entry**
- **Congregate Shelter Protocols:**
 - **Mask requirements**
 - **Social distancing**
 - **Air purifiers**
- **Majority in non-congregate sheltering**
